<u>Grading Policy</u>: Your grading is based on your attendance. The passing grade is S (Satisfactory) and non-passing grade is U (Unsatisfactory). There will be 14 classes throughout Spring 2016 semester. Students have to attend at least 12 of those classes to earn passing grade. First day

of classes is 01/19/2016 and last day of the classes is 04/26/2015. Students must sign the attendance sheets, otherwise, they will be counted as absent. If students miss any classes during withdraw period, those missed classes will be counted as absence.
